On this holy and joyous Christmas Day, we extend our hearts and prayers to the beloved creatures who share our homes and fill our lives with unconditional love.


May the warmth of the manger remind us of the comfort our animal companions provide, and may the twinkling lights of the season illuminate the gratitude we feel for their presence in our lives.

Dear Friends.

On this Christmas Day we reflect on the birth of a baby boy some two thousand years ago in a faraway land. The child was born into extreme poverty with barely a roof over his head as he spent his first night on earth. Not only was his childhood marked by the impoverishment that was normal for so many in his community at the time, but his life would also be one of humility, devoid of any of the trappings of wealth.

The baby that was born into poverty in Bethlehem possessed something more valuable than any baubles or trinkets. His wealth was his message. His manifesto was one of love, peace, forgiveness and hope. This message which originated in the comparatively small geographical region around the Sea of Galilee in Judea, gave birth to the movement we know today as Christianity. While we know that the world into which Jesus was born was troubled, the impact of this one humble birth on two thousand years of history, is not possible to measure.

Today our world feels just as troubled as it must have appeared to those young parents who accepted the awesome responsibility of giving birth to, and raising, the Son of God. Not everything is hopeless. All around us we see the green shoots that reveal how the message of Jesus continues to resonate in our troubled world. We see an open door to the stranger in need. We see many acts of compassion for those who have become lost in the world. We see formidable resistance to the forces of hatred and destruction. In our young people, we hear the loudness of their indignation as they seek to reverse the ongoing damage to our planet.

We wish you all a very Happy and Peaceful Christmas and a New Year in which we embrace the message of the man who started life as the Baby Jesus, with renewed vigour, assured by the enduring truth that God remains by our side during every moment of 2024.
